4.The effect of the funding on pupils' sport participation and attainment

A. Four teachers have received training in Gymnastics, Dance and Games. Staff conferencing shows that the coaches working in the classes have had a positive effect on improving their teaching skills. The staff make notes in sessions 'so they can use them again later in the year'. Staff are now teaching aspects of gymnastics which they had 'avoided teaching for years' and now they are much 'more confident'.	A. Four staff have benefitted from working with the specialist coach to develop their skills in teaching PE and Games. Observations by the SP lead have confirmed that the children have continued to receive high quality sessions from the coaches.	A. All year groups have had high quality sport sessions delivered by MLT or Sports Premium coaches which has enabled teachers and TAs to develop their skills. SLT have observed the sessions to monitor the standard and moving forward the school will commit to using the coaches as part of the curriculum. The school will also introduce the new 'Golden Mile' assessment and tracking systems from next term.
B. The number of children taking part in regular sporting activities has continued to increase- In Term 1 we had 95 children taking part in lunch clubs. Numbers show we now have up to 130 children taking part in sport clubs each week. Children taking part in afterschool clubs vary between the different clubs- Numbers show we are struggling with some of the Premier Sport Clubs but the numbers are really healthy in both football clubs. One of the football clubs started last year with 2 children in the first session, now they have 20.	B. More children are taking part in lunch time clubs as the clubs are now open to the two Year R classes. We have the capacity for 140 children to take in clubs each week. We have opened up another club and in KS2 the numbers have increased from by 30%. This was achieved by asking the Years 5 and 6 what clubs they wanted to take part in which resulted in all clubs being filled. Participation in after school clubs has increased by 24% compared to this time last year showing that the clubs are getting more popular over time. The most popular clubs are gymnastics and we have introduced end of term showcases to share the achievements with family and friends.	B. At the end of Term 6 we had met our initial target (85%) of all pupils in KS2 taking part in some form of regular exercise during the year (Y3-89%, Y4 86% and 92%, Y5 89% and Year 6 100%). In KS1 there has been an increase pupils who have taken part in lunch clubs: Year RR- 81%, Year RS- 86%, Year 1-83%, Year 2-88%. In the annual pupil survey many of the children thought that Downton Primary School encouraged them to be fit and healthy. (Y2- 98%, Y3-94%, Y40 88%, Y4H 83%, Y5 70% and Year 6 85%). In response to 'What is the best thing about Downton Primary School?' 22% of Year 5 children linked their answers to the sport provision at school.

C. So far 37 children have represented the school in competitive sports and this will continue to increase as we go through the year. We hope that between 60-70 of the 136 children in Ks2 will take part in the mini-marathon in May 2019.	C. During Terms 3 and 4 33 children represented the school in competitive fixtures. This was slightly lower as some events had to be rescheduled to Term 5. Some of our sports coaches have started travelling with the children to sport events so they can continue coaching on the day of the events. We have organised 2 mini marathon training sessions for after school next term and will be running an elite morning running club which children will be invited to.	C. In Terms 5 and 6 the school linked the lunch time clubs to specific sporting fixtures which were in the diary. The impact of this was that the children were more prepared for the events. Over 80 children represented the school at the annual mini marathon which shows that children of all abilities felt confident in their own ability as they met individual targets. The regular afterschool training has shown that children were committed to regular exercise. The early morning running club where children were invited to attend was very popular and we were successful in the race. The school won the under 9 individual race and the under 9 girls came first in the large school category. Our under 9 boys came second in the large school category. In Term 5 we came first and third in the under 9 cross country competition and 28 children from KS1/./';/;/;/; took part in an athletic event working with other local schools.
